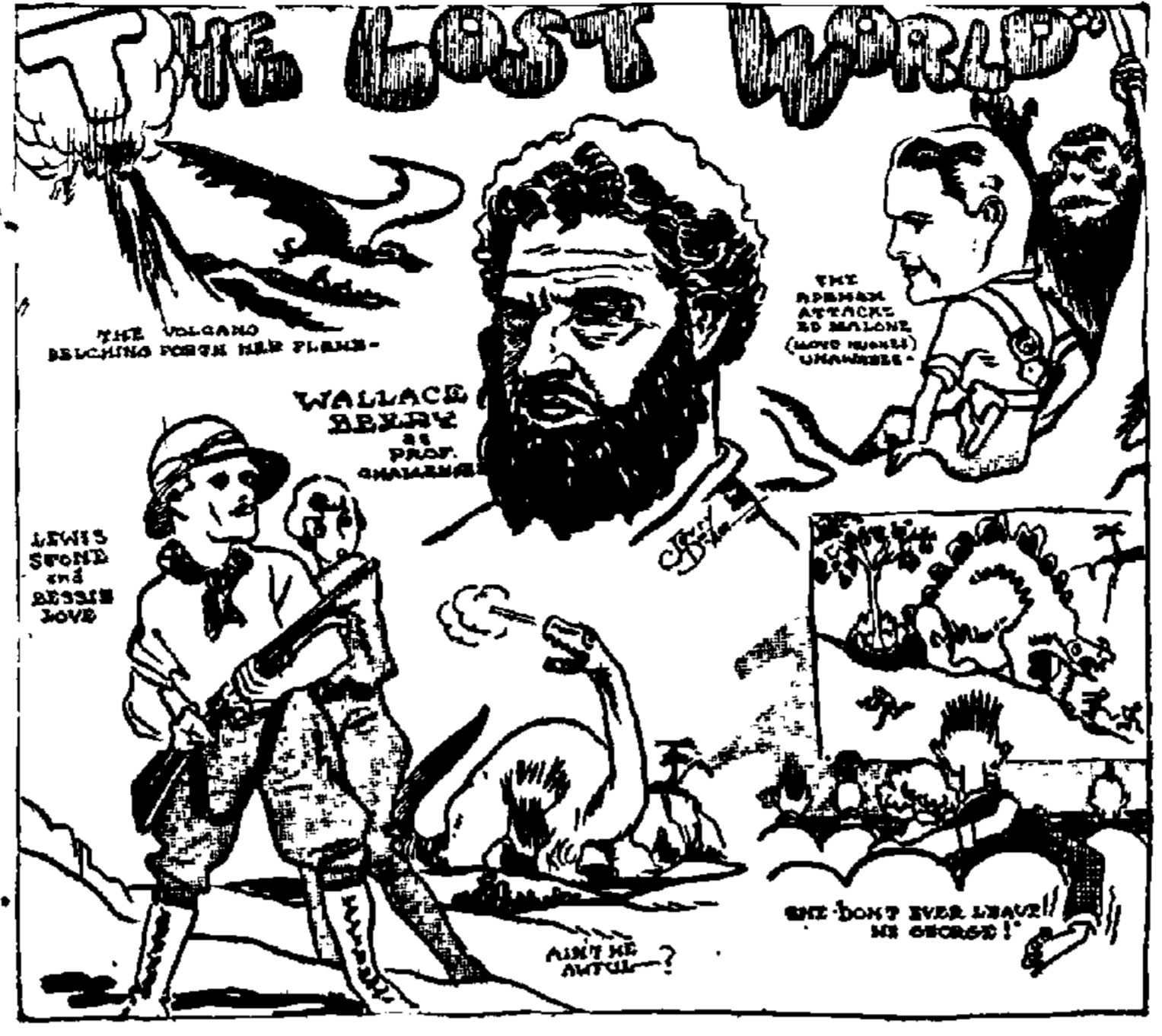

PROGRAM FOR CONVENTION ON RELIGIOUS EDUCATION WILL BE ATTRACTIVE ONE The program of the coming 17th New York State Sunday School Convention for Binghamton, October 14, 15 and 16, is attracting large attention throughout the state. The program revolves itself into a three-day institute for the intensive training of leaders in Religious Education. The one insistent aim of the program builders has been the ultimate making of a better citizenry for the Empire State. The national government, the state, counties and cities are combinedly spending millions of dollars in training teachers to teach the three "R's": the first "R," religion, the most important subject in the whole science of education, has not been taught with the thoroughness of which it is entitled in the elementary and secondary educational years of children and youth. This fact is appreciated today as never before by the church, as well as by teachers of political economy.

Man Killed in Crash. Ithaca, N. Y., Sept. 21.—(AP)—Frank Fanning, 30, proprietor of the Lehigh Valley House in this city, was instantly killed, and John T. Egbert, a local coal dealer, was seriously injured in an automobile accident on the Ithaca-Elmira highway, 11 miles southwest of this city late last night. Two cars had collided in the highway and Fanning's car ran into the wreckage. Fanning was badly injured. Egbert sustained a fractured right arm and bruises and is also suffering from shock.

\$483,000 SPENT TO EXTEND LINES Gas and Electric Company Improves Service in 23 Communities. More than \$483,000 worth of work was found necessary this year to expand and improve the gas and electric service of this section, according to figures made public today. This sum is considerably larger than the \$300,000 which was spent last year, and shows the steady growth of communities in Central New York. Some of this work is nearly completed and some of it just begun. This year a total of \$223,000 will be spent by the Empire Gas and Electric Company to improve its gas service and meet new demands. Additions to the network of gas lines alone will cost more than \$147,000. Of this amount the new main to Seneca Falls will take \$84,000, additions to the distribution system in Clifton Springs \$13,000; and general additions throughout the territory \$49,500. Improvements at the Geneva gas plant will cost \$54,000 when completed, and the plant will then be in condition to meet all demands placed upon it. New gas meters will cost nearly \$11,000. More than \$225,000 will be spent to take care of the new demands for electric service. New lines to serve districts which are now without electric service will cost \$85,000. These new lines include one from Geneva to MacDouglass, one from Auburn to Troop and one from Fayette to Romulus as well as other important construction. Improvements at the State Street substation in Auburn are expected to cost \$26,000. Poles will cost nearly \$29,000, wire \$31,000 meters \$23,500, and transformers nearly \$19,000. These amounts, combined with the \$36,000 necessary for general improvements, will be expended to meet the demand caused by the growth of the 23 communities served. Under the rules of the Public Service Commission, additions and improvements such as these must be financed by a sale of securities; their cost cannot be included in the rates charged for service. This is usually financed through a sale of preferred stock to customers, with the result that more than 2,000 people of this district are now shareholders in the company.

This production, directed by Henry King, is a film version of the famous novel by George Eliot. Lillian Gish, as ever, is superb in the title role, and the picture has an added attraction in Dorothy Gish, who is seen with her sister for the first time since Orphans of the Storm.
